Once upon a time, photos were real, people trusted the news and there was no such thing as "alternative facts."

Today, technology has changed everything – and still is. Between Photoshop, apps that allow anyone to create Deepfake videos and the surge of biased websites posing as neutral news sources, everything you read, see or hear could be fake.

That's why Peoria Public Library wants to provide our patrons with a field guide to spotting misleading information, as well as resources to help you and your family exercise your critical thinking skills. Unfortunately, buyer beware now applies to how we consume information in our daily lives. During Media Literacy Week (Oct. 25-30), Peoria Public Library will host virtual classes for students and adults as well as host a Media Literacy Week Challenge at all our locations.

Believe It or Not! Media Literacy Tools You Can Trust Wednesday, Oct. 27 -- 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. (Zoom link will be on our website)

Students will explore the basics of media literacy and practice using tools to evaluate the accuracy and reliability of a wide range of sources.

With online, expert guides from the Freedom Forum, a nonpartisan 501 (c)(3) foundation that fosters First Amendment freedoms for all, students will learn the answers to questions like, "Is it ever OK to cite

Wikipedia?" and "What makes a source trustworthy?"

Students will get a set of tools to evaluate sources online, on TV and in print, with an emphasis on developing research skills. Through hands-on activities and discussion, students learn how to build their media savvy and put their new tools and abilities to the test.

September was Hunger Action Month, but also the first anniversary of Peoria Public Library going fine free. "As we approached the first anniversary of being fine free, we thought we should celebrate that gift to our community with another act of giving," said Peoria Public Library Executive Director Randall Yelverton. The Peoria Public Library Board of Trustees unanimously approved adopting a fine-free policy during the height of the pandemic in 2020 as a means to erase all barriers to access to the library's multimillion-dollar collection of resources and materials.

Peoria Public Library partnered with the Food Pantry Network – Heart of Illinois and the Partnership for a Healthy Community, a community-driven partnership of public and private partners working together to address health issues across Peoria, Tazewell and Woodford counties.
