In a first-ever "Fine Free + Fare Free" initiative, the Greater Peoria Mass Transit District (GPMTD) will offer free CityLink fixed bus rides throughout September for Peoria, Pekin, Peoria Heights and Fondulac library patrons in honor of National Library Card Sign-up Month.

Riders will need to show a library card from one of these four libraries to ride for free on any of CityLink's fixed routes across Peoria, Peoria Heights, East Peoria and Pekin between Sept. 1-30.

In addition to promoting National Library Card Sign-Up Month, September is also the 2ndanniversary of Peoria and Fondulac libraries going fine free, thus the "Fine Free + Fare Free" promotion. Pekin Library, which already offered fine-free library cards for children, will extend this advantage to all Pekin Library card holders in September. Peoria Heights has been fine free since 2016.

"We can't thank CityLink enough for offering this generous incentive to everyone who holds a library card from one of these libraries," said Randall Yelverton, Executive Director of Peoria Public Library. Grant-funded STEAM Programming Coming to Lincoln Branch

Whether it's stepping into the shoes of an astronaut or the smock of a famous painter, Cynthia Smith is committed to inspiring students through innovative STEAM programming.

Smith, manager of Peoria Public Library's Lincoln Branch, has secured two grants to expand STEAM programming for grades 5-8. The \$12,500 Project Next Generation (PNG) grant will pay for three virtual reality headsets as part of Lincoln Branch's science, technology, art, and math (STEAM) programming being rolled out in the fall.


The grant also covers two local mentors who will have a hand in designing and teaching the programming related to VR technology. While there will be an opportunity for games, Smith said the primary focus will be the exploration of space.


Lincoln Branch was one of just 30 Illinois public libraries to receive a 2023 Project Next Generation (PNG) grant.

Another \$1,800 grant from the Fine Arts Society of Peoria will spur creation of a new visual arts program in cooperation with the Peoria Guild of Black Artists.

Banned Books Week: Sept. 18-24

Banned Books Week started 40 years ago this year in response to a sudden surge in the number of challenges to books in schools, bookstores and libraries.

Even after four decades of shining the light on the value of free and open access to information, efforts across the country to censor books is on the rise.

Between 2020 and 2021, the number of challenges nationwide to library materials has more than tripled, according to the American Library Association's Office for Intellectual Freedom. Banned Books Week 2022 will be held September 18 – 24.

The theme of this year's event is "Books Unite Us. Censorship Divides Us."

The ALA <u>Office for Intellectual Freedom</u> (OIF) compiles <u>lists of challenged books</u> as reported in the media and submitted by librarians and teachers across the country. The Top 10 Challenged Books of 2021 are:

1. Gender Queer by Maia Kobabe

Reasons: Banned, challenged, and restricted for LGBTQIA+ content and because it was considered to have sexually explicit images

2. Lawn Boy by Jonathan Evison

Reasons: Banned and challenged for LGBTQIA+ content and because it was considered to be sexually explicit

3. All Boys Aren't Blue by George M. Johnson

Reasons: Banned and challenged for LGBTQIA+ content and profanity and because it was considered to be sexually explicit

4. Out of Darkness by Ashley Hope Perez

Reasons: Banned, challenged, and restricted for depictions of abuse and because it was considered to be sexually explicit

5. The Hate U Give by Angie Thomas

Reasons: Banned and challenged for profanity and violence and because it was thought to promote an anti-police message and indoctrination of a social agenda

6. The Absolutely True Diary of a Part-Time Indian by Sherman Alexie

Reasons: Banned and challenged for profanity, sexual references, and use of a derogatory term

7. Me and Earl and the Dying Girl by Jesse Andrews

Reasons: Banned and challenged because it was considered sexually explicit and degrading to women

8. The Bluest Eye by Toni Morrison

Reasons: Banned and challenged because it depicts child sexual abuse and was considered sexually explicit

9. This Book is Gay by Juno Dawson

Reasons: Banned, challenged, relocated, and restricted for providing sex education and LGBTQIA+ content

10. Beyond Magenta by Susan Kuklin

Reasons: Banned and challenged for LGBTQIA+ content and because it was considered to be sexually explicit.
